WAITING IS HARD

As I was preparing to write this, a song lyric kept bouncing around in my head. It's the refrain from a Tom Petty song, *The Waiting*, that is really about a relationship between a guy and his new girlfriend, and this article has nothing to do with that relationship. But those words have been echoing in my head, over and over:

The waiting is the hardest part. Every day you get one more yard. You take it on faith, you take it to the heart. The waiting is the hardest part.

I know why it has been bouncing around. Because, while I am writing this article, we have been waiting for almost 3 weeks to get the results back from Jodi's biopsy. We all know how long it takes to get medical reports back, and we all know how hard that waiting can be. I mean, don't we wait much of our life?

Now that we have moved, my waiting in traffic has become a great reality. Concord Road at 8:00 am or 5:00 pm is a real "waiting game." We wait at appointments. We wait in grocery store lines, in concert lines, at ballgame concession stands. We wait for the light to turn green, for the oven to heat up, for the water in the shower to get hot. We wait for babies to be born, for the sun to go down, and for the sun to come up. Ok, some of those are a bit over-the-top, but still, we do wait.

I ran across a blog from 2017, and they did a logistical analysis of how much time we spend waiting. In 2017, Americans waited an average of 20 minutes a day for the bus or train, 32 minutes whenever they visited a doctor, 28 minutes in security lines whenever they traveled, 21 minutes for a significant other to get ready to go out, 13 hours annually waiting on hold for a customer service (*not this guy*), 38 hours each year waiting in traffic (those living in big cities wait in traffic more than 50 hours annually), which equals about 37 billion hours each year waiting in line somewhere. Some might say we were pretty patient people.

But we aren't. We want instant gratification, instant answers. Granted, we aren't the first nor will we be the last to want instant answers. We have for these last few months been looking at the Old Testament. And as we have seen with the Israelites in Exodus, even then they were hard pressed to wait. The minute something goes wrong or food is scarce or they get thirsty, they blame Moses or God or anyone for this fine mess they find themselves in. Waiting is the hardest part!

Why is that, though? Is it because of the unknown possibilities? The longer we wait the more our minds begin to think through all of the things that could go wrong. I know those thoughts have lingered in my mind for the last three weeks. And so I have tried to find a way to make waiting not quite so hard. I found some scripture:

But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.—Romans 8:25

Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God.

And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

— Philippians 4:6-7

And please, I know these are great scriptures, important scriptures, powerful words, but, as powerful and important as they are, they don't always take the hard, the struggle, away. I mean, Moses couldn't do it with the Israelites. For that matter, neither could God. They still built that dang golden calf because they wanted something right away—and God saved them from those Egyptians and everything!

I guess this whole drivel of an article is my way of saying that waiting is the hardest part—until the next part comes. The only thing I can do is admit my weakness and look to the heavens and pray that God will keep loving me in spite of it all. And, if these stories are any indication, I'm pretty sure God will. I hope you will, too.

- An alternate garbage removal company is being looked for due to an increase in pricing.

- Program Ministry Reports were provided. Of note, Member Care Ministry proposed standards for creating meal trains to care for members when needed. The Session approved the recommendation.
- Ordination and Installation of Elder Class of 2026 will be August 27, 2023.
- Suggestions for lighting changes for the Narthex were presented. The Session requested the changes be sent to Building and Grounds for pricing.
- It was pointed out that the storage shed needs some repairs and requests that Building and Grounds evaluate.
- A request to use the ball field was approved pending signed liability waivers from the baseball team families.

- Reverend Rush will be out Sunday, September 24, and October 5-7 for the Memphis Theological Seminary Board Meeting.

SACRED SPARKS NEWS

I looked around at *laundry* one day and realized we were definitely outnumbered. Sacred Sparks Ministry began the work of serving our friends experiencing homelessness and extreme poverty about 10 years ago. In that decade of service, we rarely encountered children...until recently. When we opened the Loads of Love laundry ministry in March of 2022, we reconnected with our friends at the Women and Children's Mission in Nashville. Once we discovered there are no laundry facilities at the mission, we wanted to help and scheduled a weekly pickup. We quickly added a second pickup for women at the mission who have children. Suddenly there were children everywhere. At last count, we have about 30 children we see on a regular basis. We call them our "Laundry Littles" and we just love the energy and excitement they bring to laundry day. We now maintain a Laundry Little's Closet where moms can pick up diapers, formula, wipes, etc., when they come to do laundry.
